# **Rector's Report**

If I had to pick one word to describe my feelings about 2023, it would be grateful.

I've been grateful for our continuing efforts to open our doors to the wider community. Our efforts with both the English Tea and Marketplace were well attended, and I look forward to restarting the Wine and Cheese Tasting fundraiser in 2024. Trunk-or-Treat was our biggest event ever, with so many Trunks *and* Treaters, as well as a new music station for young ones to play instruments, thanks to Kipp Gill!

I'm grateful to see our children's programs thriving, with a marvelous Vacation Bible School and a restarted Sunday School. I'm always delighted by the participation and engagement of our children during the children's sermons and by listening to our growing Children's Choir, which even included a joint anthem with our Adult Choir this past year. We also began a new Junior Chapter of the Daughters of the King, offering prayer and service opportunities for our youth. God is Good.

I've been so grateful for our continuing efforts to experiment. Our Outdoor Stations of the Cross were well received this past year and you can expect to see these efforts expand in 2024, with the possibility of more permanent displays. Our new outdoor sign now regularly proclaims to travelers along Watson Boulevard the many activities at All Saints.

I've been grateful for our expanding hospitality as a community. We have so many supportive activities led by our Ushers, Greeters, Friends' ministry, and our new Coffee Bar hosts, as we seek to welcome everyone on Sunday mornings and come to know one another better. And I so appreciate your ongoing efforts to invite others to explore All Saints, whether through our bi-weekly Dungeons and Dragons fellowship, a picnic, a mid-week Evensong, or an evening potluck and hymn sing.

I'm so grateful for our community's engagement in fellowship and learning. Our ongoing potluck meals, seasonal programs, and retreats are a delight. This past year we explored the new *Real Issues Speaker Series*, with opportunities to learn something new, get to know one another better, and broaden our involvement in the wider community. A big thanks to Marsha Buzzell, Stephanie Johnson, and Leslie Tidwell for initiating this new series. And I'm grateful for our small group ministries and our active participation in special events that allow us to learn more about our Living, Loving God, and lean into loving our neighbors. These opportunities have included Education for Ministry, Monday Book Group, Sunday School, Inquirer's Classes, and attending a viewing of the new movie, *The Philadelphia 11*.

I'm grateful for our continuing commitment to Outreach and serving others. All Saints has generously supported the growing needs of the Food Pantry, Breaking Barriers, and Family Promise. Our ECW was blessed to be able to donate at pre-COVID levels to our local schools and non-profits. All Saints also made significant contributions this year to the broader community through your gifts to Appleton Ministries, Episcopal Communities Foundation, and Episcopal Relief and Development (Maui relief efforts), as well as supporting local homelessness initiatives. Thanks to all who made this giving possible.

I've been grateful for our community support of individual calls to ministry, as we've helped those pursuing both a deeper engagement in Lay Ministry, as well as calls to Holy Orders. Paul Davison's sermons as a licensed Lay Preacher have been enlightening. Debra Bruner-Smith completed her candidacy field work here at All Saints and was ordained a vocational Deacon of the Episcopal Church. Dominique Deming was called as a Postulant to the Priesthood and continues her seminary education. Taylor Irwin continues her seminary education and I expect to hear more about her discernment progress this Spring.

Many of you know that this past year has been personally challenging for me with my mother's death, and I'm deeply grateful for the life-giving support of this All Saints community. It's amazing to realize I've begun my 6th year here with you, serving a community that so actively strives to support one another, to be open to the

nudgings of the Spirit, and to use our God-given talents to carry Christ's light into the world. I look forward to the new year and amazing opportunities to explore how we can walk together in Jesus' Way of Love.

#### **Deacon's Report**

This past year has given us opportunities to continue to expand our sense of community: from church to neighborhood to Warner Robins. We have experienced a year of growth, excitement, new possibilities, and creative ministry. This is a very good thing! We've continued to engage in our "legacy ministries," while also growing our capacity to assist our brothers and sisters in obtaining the documentation they need to secure work and places to live, helping families with the things needed for a new school year, building ministry relationships with other churches, and working with community agencies.

If you didn't know it, the Food Pantry has grown and is amazingly busy on Tuesday mornings. Our amazing volunteers continue to bless the community with their good nature, compassion, humor, and hard work and are a true gift to All Saints and the people of Warner Robins.

Breaking Barriers has also continued to grow. The folks in Warner Robins who struggle to pay their utilities are very grateful that All Saints has so generously provided the funds and prayers to keep this part of our ministries alive and available. The growth in utility assistance has led to Ellen Strait exclusively focusing her time and energy to serving the folks of Warner Robins with utility assistance. She is doing a superb job with the increased responsibility and calls to minister in more ways than just helping with a utility bill.

Breaking Barriers also ministers to folks who need their vital records -- Social Security card, Photo ID, and Certified Copy of their Birth Certificate. These documents are required to obtain jobs and housing and to qualify for many services that will help them move to secure living. More local churches and agencies have learned that All Saints has done the work to figure out how we can help folks with these vital records and are referring folks to All Saints. This has created a new challenge for us, as different churches offer their ministries at different times on different days. To better offer this ministry, we need to work towards a way to provide folks help on different days and different times than our current limited availability on Tuesday mornings. One possibility would be to offer this guidance by appointment, rather than a "walk-in" basis. In order to make this possible, we would need to have a few people available to meet folks for their appointments. Please join me in prayer that God will lead us to the most meaningful way to continue our support of our vulnerable sisters and brothers.

We have also developed a strong relationship with the Warner Robins Homeless Coalition. A very diverse group of leaders have been meeting and working together to strengthen our service to those among us who have no bed or security. We have been building a network of churches and agencies to work together to address specific needs and services to work towards all of our sisters and brothers having a life of justice, peace, and dignity. A building was purchased by the city this year and is being renovated to provide beds, a cafeteria, and meeting spaces to provide training and support services as folks move towards independence and security. Several folks at All Saints have already been working together with others in the community to help make this opportunity possible. There will certainly be more opportunities for ministry once the center is opened.

We at All Saints have been blessed with many opportunities to minister to our sisters and brothers in Warner Robins. Thankfully, we have continued to step into both strengthening the legacy ministries and exploring new opportunities. It has been a grand year!

#### Senior Warden's Report

Last year our Vestry set some goals at the beginning of the year. These goals have been met. They included completing a new Church Directory, new signage, and establishing a coffee station, among others.

Thanks to the generous support of our congregation, our Stewardship campaign was successful, and we are able to look confidently to the future. We are so fortunate to have Mike Tarnoff and Beth Wood directing us in all things financial.

I doubt we will ever take for granted our ability to gather and worship together. Under the direction of Kipp Gill, our choir has filled our beloved church with beautiful music. We are so grateful that Mary Christian has also been sharing her musical talent with us. We continue to have Livestream through Facebook and YouTube thanks to the efforts and leadership of Pierce Christie. The Altar Guild teams continue to take excellent care of our church. In addition to our Sunday Worship, we are so glad to be able to again offer Sunday School for our younger members. Watching the Children's Program grow and seeing the children participate in our services has been a highlight this year. Many thanks to all who have worked in all the Christian Education activities.

Through the efforts of ECW and Fellowship, we were able to complete and enjoy many Parish Projects. Marketplace and The English Tea were very successful, and we look forward to the return of the Wine and Cheese Tasting to its traditional February timing in the new year. ECW was able to continue the December tradition of sharing the profits of these projects with various nonprofit groups in our Community.

Our Co-Junior Wardens, Judy Reynolds and Linda Christie, did a great job of leading a team to care for our buildings and grounds. A recent evaluation helped to clarify some items that remain on our list of needs. However, in general, our facility is in very good shape.

We have continued our Greeter program and the Friends Ministry to be certain that all feel welcome here at All Saints. The continued use of name tags helps those who are new to our church.

Our Food Pantry has been very busy and has served so many families in our community. Thanks to Jesse Underwood and a great team of volunteers, we have been able to continue to serve the public every Tuesday. Deacon Barbara has continued to run the Breaking Barriers program. These programs have been able to help people connect to resources that can change their lives.

In 2023, All Saints again partnered with Family Promises of Houston County. We have provided meals and contributed to a fund to help cover the utilities of the Family Promise Center.

It has been my honor to serve as Senior Warden again in 2023. Working with Mother Bonnie has been such a blessing. I was also blessed to serve with Vestry Members Barbara Attaway, Mary Christian, Linda Christie, Judy Reynolds, Anne Sanders, Leslie Tidwell, and Bronwyn Young, plus Linda Gerdes who serves as the Vestry Clerk. Barbara and I will be coming off the Vestry this year. Joining the Vestry are Lillian Burton, Rachael Heidler, and Roland Leach. Bronwyn Young will be serving as your new Senior Warden.

I know they will do a wonderful job. Linda Gerdes continues as our Church Administer. Linda and Freeway do a great job of keeping us informed and organized.

Over the past three years as I served on the Vestry, I have felt such support and encouragement from the congregation. Thank you all for making this such a meaningful experience. I am so grateful to be a part of this amazing Church Family.

#### Junior Warden's Report

First, I'd like to take the opportunity to thank all of those who contributed support to my Junior Warden ministry. I could not have done it all on my own, so thank you so much (and you know who you are); your promise to pitch in paid off for sure.

Many tasks were completed with the assistance/leadership of my co-Junior Warden, Linda Christie, as grounds chairman. She organized/coordinated numerous yard clean-up days which were successfully completed with the assistance of a group of dedicated parishioners. The grounds always look lovely, and much of that effort is due to Linda's devotion and dedication to All Saints; thank you, Linda.

Here is a list of projects that were completed during the year, for example:

- 1. Completion of 2023 LED lighting conversion, with help from matching GIPL grant funds.
- 2. Replacement of 2 HVAC units (Parish Hall, Food Pantry shed).
- 3. Removal of inoperable equipment (i.e. kitchen microwave, unused window A/C unit in Choir room)
- 4. Repair outdoor siding of the Christian Education building.
- 5. Weather-stripping around church entry doors.
- 6. Indoor cleanup, to include minor repairs to existing equipment (door hinges on bathroom doors and ECW room cabinet door).
- 7. Outdoor cleanup to include the relocation of the memorial bench and massive tree trimming and limb removal. Thank you, Jesse and Gene!
- 8. Removal of old outdoor sign and replacement with new LED sign and addition of Flint Electric hookup. Replaced phone number characters on the outdoor Episcopal Church sign.
- 9. Kitchen freezers were emptied, cleaned, and re-shelved.
- 10. Bill Attaway and I did a review of the circuit box in the Parish Hall to identify the circuits for future use.
- 11. Many small jobs were performed by Jesse that are necessary, but unknown to most (me). Thank you so much for all you do to keep All Saints up and running.

I hope I have not overlooked any major jobs that have been performed in 2023, and that this will give an idea to our congregation and community of how support, devotion, and dedication help our All Saints parish.

In many aspects, the year 2023, marked a metamorphosis for All Saints' Mary's Heart and Martha's Hands Chapter of Daughters of the King. With the advent of COVID and the enactment of safety measures, the in-person annual Diocesan Assembly ceased for three years until February 25, 2023! As such, with excitement, several members from All Saints convened at the in-person February 25th Annual Diocesan Assembly held at the Cathedral of St. Philip. My impression is that the cocooning process unleashed an activism mentality with God's help to press forward against adversities to do HIS work in all of our capacities.

Some of the highlights from 2023 activities included:

- February 26, 2023 Annual Chapter Rededication Service
- March April 2023 Assessed the level of interest to start a Jr. DOK Chapter

In 2023, a concerted effort was made to draw the circle wider by engaging in partnerships and relationships to include joint Zoom chapter meetings with middle Georgia and Atlanta area DOK chapters. Atlanta DOK Diocesan Assembly and National DOK leadership were consulted at various times to ensure proper alignment with directives. Additionally, a joint sponsorship of the Real Issues Speaker Series emerged with All Saints EfM graduates, and with the City of Warner Robins, our chapter sponsored 200 personal care packages for our homeless neighbors. We anticipate utilizing the

partnership format in 2024 because it helps generate energy from a variety of sources to help meet established goals. Finally, we plan to have representation at the Order of the Daughters of the King, Triennial 2024, June 26th -30th, in Louisville, Kentucky.

The Daughters of the King make a lifetime vow to live by a Rule of Life. Each Rule of Life requires a spiritual discipline of daily prayer, service, and evangelism. Because of these vows taken at admission, The Order is not simply an organization, but a religious order that is part of a Global Order of Daughters existing for more than 139 years with international chapters found in 21 countries. Today, the Order's membership includes women in the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran (ELCA), and Roman Catholic churches. The only spiritual attribute needed to become a Daughter is a sincere desire to draw nearer to God and to help others do the same. An aspiring member can usually complete a combination of study and discernment within three to four months. Finally, all Daughters faithfully wear the cross of The Order. Membership in The Order is open to women at every stage of life. The diversity of different ages strengthens and enriches our adult chapters.

Life is short and we do not have much time to gladden the hearts of those who travel with us, so be swift to love, make haste to be kind, and go in peace to love and serve the Lord. Membership is open to all.

#### Junior Daughters

Following Mother Bonnie's lead in the installation service, Atlanta Diocesan President Janet Livingston presented the new Junior Daughters Charter Certificate for the St. Therese of Lisieux Chapter, in the sight of God and before the All Saints Episcopal congregation on Sunday, August 6, 2023. Stephanie Johnson and Marsha Buzzell were installed as the charter Junior Directresses. Afterward, they welcomed Amaya, Maddie, and I'Serenity as the new charter members.

Along with local members in attendance, special DOK guests included Kelli Mack, Atlanta Diocesan Junior Daughters Directress; Margaret Rodeheaver; Nidia Svare and her daughter, Avery from St. Paul's Episcopal, Macon; and our very own, Debra Bruner-Smith, Atlanta Diocesan Vice President.

Additionally, the national DOK office helped support the chartering of All Saints' Jr. DOK chapter through an Alpha grant. The Junior Chapter will bring the young daughters closer to God by providing a community of support and mentorship from the Junior Directresses, and the church's Senior DOK chapter, Mary's Heart and Martha's Hands, through the Rule of Prayer, Service, Evangelism, and Bible study.

The experience that inspired us and brought the young daughters closer to God revolved around the notion of God's work in the world around us. The making of a beaded bracelet by each young daughter was included in the initial study sessions to help the group think about a broader circle of the world to include all types of people. The circle represented the world, and the different colors of the beads represented the diverse ethnicities and cultures throughout the world. The hands-on activity augmented with the Bible study helped the girls appreciate and respect the differences among them. It led to discussions about having differences with people but remembering the Golden Rule to Love Others. It helped them more concretely relate to and understand, "What is a Christian" by relating to how they reacted to various scenarios at school, in the community, or at home.

Similar initiatives will be designed to empower the junior daughters to recognize the ways in which God's love and guidance can be seen in their daily lives and to encourage them to actively seek out opportunities to serve others and make a positive impact in their communities.

Some highlighted activities from 2023 include:

• The Jr. Daughters accepted an invitation to write encouraging notes to a new Junior Chapter in Spain that coincidentally admitted three new members to the Luminares de Cristo (Lights of Christ) Junior Chapter in Mostoles, Spain near Madrid on the same date of August 6, 2023. Additionally, the Jr. Daughters made beads for the chapter's members.

• The Jr. Daughters made a bracelet, wrote a thank you card, and sent a get-well message to a dear friend of the chapter who was very inspirational in the making of its banner.

• As a service project to help support the Sr. DOK, along with WRAFB volunteers, the Jr. Daughters helped pack the 200 personal care packages for the homeless neighbors.

In 2024, the Jr. Daughters will continue to explore, study, and engage in meaningful activities to help them get in touch with God's purpose for them. Finally, we are hopeful that there will be Jr. Chapter representation at the Triennial held on June 26-30, 2024 in Louisville, Kentucky.

# Episcopal and Lutheran Fellowship (ELF)

# **Breaking Barriers**

Many barriers hold folks back from a secure and stable life and this ministry assists in two key areas: utility assistance, as maintaining utilities can be the difference in keeping a family together and healthy; and providing assistance in obtaining vital records that help with employment, housing, and other services.

The utility assistance available through this ministry helps to assure a level of stability for families who struggle to take care of themselves and their families. This year, through the generosity of our All Saints' family to the Rector's Discretionary Fund, we were able to assist 146 families with their utilities. That is a 44% increase from 2022.

With our Vital Records assistance, we continue to see a small, but regular flow of folks requiring assistance, but we've also discovered that there's a need for more flexibility with appointment scheduling than we can offer with our current resources. # Family Promise

All Saints continued its support of Family Promise of Greater Houston County throughout 2023. Generally, we provide an evening meal approximately 3 times per quarter for a total of 12 meals per year. We also contribute to a fund to help cover the cost of utilities at the Family Promise Center. We continue to partner with Trinity United Methodist Church. Meal sign-up is done through SignUpGenius. Trained Volunteers deliver the meals to the Family Promise Facility in Perry, Georgia. The volunteers set up the dinner and then share the meal with the families. In 2024, we are currently scheduled to provide dinner on February 4th, March 10th, and 12th. We will put up a SignupGenius when we know the number of family members. Usually, that is about a week before the scheduled meal.

Families that were served last year met the criteria established by Family Promise. They had minor children, were employed, went through a background check, and a drug test. During their stay, they work with the employees of Family Promise to budget and save funds to establish a home after they graduate from the program. Some families needed help with things such as medical issues and car repairs. Several families were able to complete the program and return to independent living. All Saints was blessed to be a part of helping these families make such a positive life change for their families.

# Food Pantry

Our Food Pantry has continued to faithfully support the local community on Tuesdays, 9:30-11:00 a.m. This important work can only be done with a faithful team of volunteers, including Ashley Adams, Patrick Bartness, Lillian Burton, Melissa and Brooklyn Crow, Jimmy Eubanks, Winnie Goldston, Sandy Lee, Darlene Meloche, Mischa McNeese, Dawn Ray, Sandy Scammell, Gene Soles, Mike Tarnoff, the Turner Family (Rich, Libbet, and sons, James and Simon), Jess Underwood, and Susan Wynn. We are blessed to have others who also volunteer periodically during the year.

Volunteers help on Mondays by picking up donated food from Publix. On Tuesdays, other volunteers help check in our clients and distribute food. On other days, volunteers inventory our goods, place orders, and pick up food from the Macon Food Bank, helping to keep our shelves well-stocked with both donated food and Macon Food Bank purchases. Food bags are pre-packed weekly by additional volunteers, to ensure we're ready once again for the next Tuesday morning. Our Food Pantry also provides extra food bags for Thanksgiving and Christmas distribution. It's a true team effort to serve the wider community!

In 2023, the Food Pantry helped 1406 families consisting of a total of 4967 family members, a 63% increase in families assisted, from 2022. Funding for our Food Pantry continues from the generous donations of individuals both within and outside our Parish, and the ECW and Men's Group.. Thanks to all who support this important All Saints ministry. Your generosity with time, talent, and treasure is what keeps this ministry running smoothly.


