Mother Bonnie's Corner

One of my personal devotional practices during the Lenten season has been to pray the Stations of the Cross. Although this has been my practice for many years, I've experienced a feeling of deeper connection this season. I imagine some of that change has been driven by new language, as I have been praying both our "usual" Stations prayers during our weekly Wednesday noon devotions in the church, but also a contemporary version we will be using in our Outdoor Stations displays during Holy Week.

Sometimes a change in the way we pray can help us better hear with the ears of our hearts, and for me, this fresh encounter with Jesus' Way of the Cross, has caused me to hear anew Jesus' invitation to follow him. This *new listening* has me looking forward to Holy Week with great anticipation, knowing that it's only through the loss and pain of Good Friday, that we can truly come to know the great joy of Easter and that greatest gift of new life in Christ.

Perhaps you, too, are longing for a deeper connection with Jesus. Perhaps this is the time to begin anew, opening yourself to the possibilities of seeing all that is around us through Jesus' eyes — eyes that see with love and deep caring, eyes that can envision new ways to offer hospitality, compassionate care, and fellowship, while sharing the blessed truth that God is with us.

Consider taking the time to engage fully in Holy Week. Participate in our Palm Sunday service with the blessing of the Palms and a procession that begins outdoors. Find the time for a walk through our Outdoor Stations of the Cross, whether you make this journey alone or within community. Experience the liturgy on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday evenings. Explore an hour of prayer during the *Keep Watch with Me* vigil throughout Thursday night. Join us in the Sanctuary for our first Holy Saturday service at 10 am.

From our Deacon

One of my very first memories is of just being together as family whenever we visited either set of my grandparents' homes. Both had gravel driveways, the standard driveway material of Coweta County. We always knew a visitor was coming to the house when we heard the tires hit that gravel. In both homes, as soon as somebody heard the approaching vehicle, the call to "make a pot of coffee" ignited a scurrying about to grind the coffee, fill the pot with water, and cups (with saucers, back then) were gathered and set out, as if whoever was arriving was not only welcomed, but expected.

At my father's parents' house, little kids didn't get coffee and were sent to the yard to play. The grownups would usually congregate around the dining room table or the front porch. The kids were relegated to another part of the house or the yard. That was fine with us. Most kids don't like coffee anyway.

At my mother's parents' house, everybody gathered around the kitchen table with all the appropriately polite cups, saucers, spoons, cream, sugar, and any baked goods on hand. Kids sat on the laps of the adults and were just a part of any conversation, like everyone else. And it was there that I had my first ever taste of coffee, courtesy of my grandfather, Ray. (Yes, we were on a first-name basis at his non-negotiable request.)

Ray lifted his freshly poured cup of coffee off the saucer and poured a bit into the saucer. Then, as he "doctored" his coffee, he "doctored" mine with the same ingredients, just more of them – especially the cream. Then he spooned my first sip ever into my mouth and I was "HOME." I already loved my big ol' family dearly, but that day I fell head over heels in love with coffee.

Strange as it may sound, coffee just gives me whatever I need at any given moment. Connection. Seclusion. Energy. Stillness. Inspiration. Capitulation. I can take my cup with me almost everywhere with whoever is there. Some of you may have heard me say, "You can't do the work of the Lord without coffee."



I share this story with you because a new ministry is brewing.

In the not-too-distant future there will be a Coffee Bar at All Saints. It will be located in the Parish Hall right across from the Kids' Korner and include Coffee (Hi-test and Decaf), Tea, Hot Chocolate, Apple Cider, plus all the ingredients for "doctoring" your beverage of choice.

The reason is to provide a gathering place for everyone after the Sunday Service and other convenient times. This will be a much more casual time than some of our more festive gatherings in the Parish Hall: a time when quiet conversations can be enjoyed, people can get to know each other in a deeper way, and just a bit of time to simply be family.

And most important, it will give us a chance to welcome folks new to our All Saints family in a way that is not so event-driven. It can be hard to engage a large group of new folks when you're the newest kid on the block. So we're hoping our new "coffee shop" will be that familiar, fun, easy-going place to gather: an easy way to get to know folks, so everyone can have a sense of home.

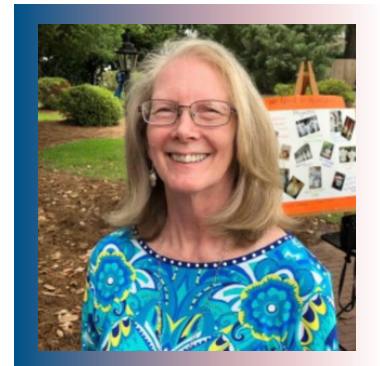

From the Senior Warden

March provided so many opportunities to participate in meaningful activities with our fellow parishioners here at All Saints. In addition to our regular happenings, we had many meaningful Lenten activities. In March, we also invited the community to share our traditional English Tea. The Tea was a great success and continues to be a favorite in the Middle Georgia Community. Thank you to Anne Sanders and her amazing group of Volunteers.



In April, we will begin a campaign to get a new Church Directory. We actually started an effort to get a new Directory in 2019, and then Covid happened and it was not completed. We will be asking everyone to complete a Family Information sheet, sign a Photo Release Form, and have a current photo. After Easter, we will be distributing forms and taking photos on Sundays. There are so many times that connections are missed because we do not have current contact information for our fellow parishioners. Perhaps we see someone on the Prayer List and want to send them a text or an email but we don't have their current information. How wonderful would it be to send a message of congratulations or support to someone you know will appreciate it. Our goal is to complete the Directory – a hard copy with photos—by this coming Fall.

As we bid goodbye to March, we begin our preparations for Holy Week. Starting on Saturday, April 1st, we begin with a Palm Cross workshop at 9 am. Sunday, April 2nd is Palm Sunday. We traditionally begin our 10:15 service outside. Maundy Thursday worship will be at 7 pm on the 6th, followed by the *Keep Watch Vigil* that begins at 8:30 pm and ends at 10 am on Friday. On Friday the 7th, we have Stations of the Cross at Noon. This will be followed by the Good Friday service at 7 pm.

Please watch for a signup sheet if you are interested in participating in The Vigil. There will also be a Holy Saturday service on the 8th at 10am. Following this service, the decorating of the Church will begin. Easter Sunday begins with the Great Vigil of Easter, a sunrise service celebrated at 6:30 am. This will be followed by a Brunch at 9 am and the children will participate in an Easter Egg Hunt at 9:30 am. We will celebrate our festive Easter Holy Eucharist at our regular worship time of 10:15 am. In April, we have so many opportunities to celebrate Christ's resurrection and salvation. We hope you will join us.

Year Round Stewardship: Ushers: A Different Kind of Worship

When you step through the church doors on a Sunday morning, someone says hello, hands you a bulletin, and makes a note on a clipboard. Bill Peters, All Saints' head usher, has been marking clipboards for over fifty years, except for a few years when his church in Virginia was tracking attendance with a flashy new technology he calls a "clicker." ("Counting goes faster with pen and paper," he says.)

Ushers make sure people have what they need and get where they need to go in order to keep the service going smoothly. They arrive before most of us, setting up the name tag board and the welcome station, clearing off the sidewalks so we won't trip over stray twigs and magnolia cones (thank you, Clifton!). They greet us as we come in and gather attendance data. If someone needs to leave suddenly in mid-service, or if a visitor asks where the restroom is, the ushers are there to open doors or give directions. They pass the plates at offering time and manage traffic during communion, lending a hand to anyone who needs help getting up and down the steps. After the service they stay to pack up the welcome tables.

During the pandemic lockdown year in 2020-2021, the ushers adapted to the new outdoor setting. On sunny days, they put out chairs on the lawn for those who couldn't bring their own. In rainstorms, they accompanied Mother Bonnie from car to car at communion time, holding up an umbrella to keep the holy wafers dry.

Beth Wood, about a year ago, was looking for a ministry she could serve in together with her husband, Ernie. She signed up at the usher table at the ministry fair, and Bill reached out soon after. She describes her ushering experience as a growth opportunity: "For people like me, who are good with faces but bad with names, I get to know more names as I greet people at the door. It challenges me to talk to everyone, to get to know more people." She appreciates the flexibility and accountability offered by the All Saints usher team. "We can schedule our usher days to accommodate our travel schedule. Bill makes the schedule three months in advance, and he always reaches out to remind us when it's our week."

When asked what he finds difficult about ushering, Bill says, "There are some parts of the service I don't see and hear, and I miss that." When greeting and directing and looking out for visitors' needs, ushers sometimes find it difficult to focus on worship in the way other congregants can. Regarding ushering and worship, Beth's take is: "I've come to think of ushering as a different kind of worship. We welcome each person into the house of worship

and set the tone. We're there consistently when people need us." Ushers worship by helping others to worship fully and freely, helping them navigate past any obstacles that stand in the way.

# Holy Week and Easter: *tell me more*

Holy Week prepares us for Easter, as we walk with Jesus through some of the worst things in the world that God's love transforms into some of the best: from betrayal and death on the cross to forgiveness, hope, and new life.

## ***Palm Sunday***

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, as we get a taste of the narrative of Holy Week, from the triumphant shouts of "Hosanna" to the devastating call to "Crucify Him," and Jesus' agonizing death, discovering that those ancient human voices are also our own.

**The Triduum:** Here we dive deeper into the story of Jesus' last days on the earth, with Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil rituals - three parts of one service, which are part of an ancient custom to honor the holiest days that connect us all.

- ***Maundy Thursday:*** We recall Jesus' last meal with his friends before his crucifixion, when Jesus shows us what it means to live into the greatest commandment, to love one another as he has loved us, as Jesus takes on the role of a servant washing the disciples' feet. This is our final Eucharist together until the Great Vigil of Easter. The Altar is stripped of all adornments and trappings, and an Altar of Repose is set up for the reserved Sacrament. There is no dismissal, helping us remember that the Triduum is one continuous service.
- ***Good Friday:*** During this service, we recall the crucifixion of Jesus, venerate the cross, and offer Holy Communion in a different way, using the sacrament reserved from the Maundy Thursday service. Again, there is no dismissal, as this is only the second part of the three services of the Triduum.
- ***The Great Vigil of Easter:*** This service leads us into the full expression of the Christian life, as we enter into the heart of our faith. We begin in the darkness just before sunrise, reminding us of the cross and grave, then light a fire to remind us of both God's first creative gift of light and the light and new creation of Jesus Christ. We hear in Scripture the Good News of all that God has done for us, offering praise for God's presence in our past and praying for God's continued presence in our lives. We renew our Baptismal vows, then joyfully proclaim the words "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!" celebrating the reality of the Resurrection and the first Eucharist of Easter.

**Festal Easter Holy Easter Eucharist:** This is our second liturgy of Easter, a celebration of Christ's resurrection, as we begin the Great Fifty Days of Easter.

## **Other Holy Week offerings:**

- ***Stations of the Cross:*** an act of devotion and pilgrimage, as we walk through 14 stations, stopping at each to say prayers and listen to reflections commemorating events in Jesus' final hours.
- ***Vigil - Keep Watch with Me:*** an act of devotion, as one or two individuals keep watch for an hour of meditative silence at the Altar of Repose, from the close of the Maundy Thursday service until 10 am on Friday.

These liturgies of Holy Week and Easter are an invitation to walk more closely with Jesus, entering the story of salvation in a unique and powerful way. Join us this year at All Saints, as we remind ourselves that God in Jesus Christ stands with us, now and always.

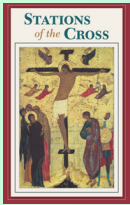

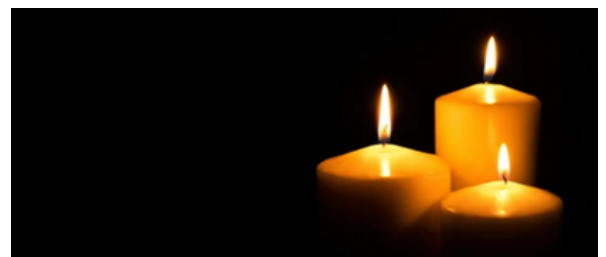

## Family Promise *Update*

Family Promise is in the process of recognizing and celebrating a decade of service in Houston County. Opening in May 2013, Family Promise has served hundreds of families including over 300 children. One of the major blessings of the last decade has been the addition of the wonderful facility in Perry. While this has added so much to the lives of those in Family Promise, it has also added to the expenses. The organization has assumed all the utilities and upkeep that have come with the property. Expenses have basically tripled!

Last year, Family Promise had a fundraiser at The Pond in Warner Robins. "Jazz in the City" was a very successful, sold-out event. The event includes live Jazz music and a brunch prepared and served by The Pond. Family Promise has decided to make "Jazz in the City" a twice-yearly event. If you are interested, the next event will be on Sunday, May 7, 2023. Tickets are \$35 per person. They are also seeking corporate sponsors.
