Mother Bonnie's Corner

This year, we celebrate Easter, the Resurrection of Jesus on March 31st, but this isn't actually a one-day event. Rather, Easter, also known as Eastertide, is a season - the Great 50 Days - as we take the time to recognize Christ appearing over and over again in resurrected form, before his Ascension.

How can you sustain the joy of Easter, throughout Eastertide? Here are some suggestions

- Meditate on our Baptismal Vows: This will be my Eastertide practice this year, as I strive, with God's help, to reflect more deeply on these questions, asking God's help to renew and strengthen my commitment to carrying Christ's light and love into the world. Join me in this practice by reflecting on these 8 questions about our beliefs, our daily practices, and how to live in Christ's Way of Love. You can find these vows on pages 304-305 of the Book of Common Prayer, and also in this newsletter, for your quick reference.
- Learn more about our Episcopal Traditions:
 Consider joining our Spring Episcopal 101 Inquirer's class, led by our Licensed Lay Catechist, Paul Davison. This series of classes begins 4/14 and provides a way to dive deeper into the Sacraments, our Episcopal practices, and how we can strive together to know more about how to "walk the talk."
- Practice Acts of Service and Generosity: Do seek opportunities to serve others and show generosity to those in need. Consider Family Promise training, so you can participate in the mealtime with these precious families. Explore how you may be able to participate in supporting this summer's Vacation Bible School. Keep your eyes open to opportunities! And know that Deacon Barbara and I are ALWAYS thrilled to talk about possibilities.

- *Celebrate the Joy of Fellowship*: We love to gather in fellowship at All Saints! Try something new this season, whether it's the ECW, Men's Group, Shawl Ministry, Sunday Coffee Bars, Monthly Potlucks, or the Annual English Tea. Or perhaps explore a new ministry: Altar Guild, Fellowship, Ushers, Greeter, Eucharistic Ministers, and Visitors. These are all opportunities to come to know one another, support one another, and celebrate the joy of fellowship in Christ.
- Continue to Proclaim the Good News: There are so many ways to share the Good News of the Risen Christ, in both word and deed! And I truly believe we begin with an attitude of gratitude, recognizing the abundant blessings of God's grace, the promise of new life found in Christ, and the willingness to pass it on.

May the joy and hope of Eastertide fill your heart to overflowing, that you may share Christ's love with all you encounter.

Baptismal Covenant - The Book of Common Prayer

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Father?

People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Celebrant: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power

of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of

the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Celebrant: Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of

bread, and in the prayers?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and

return to the Lord?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

People: I will, with God's help.

People: I will, with God's help.

of every human being?

Lately I've been asking myself, "What do I really know about the people of Warner Robins?"

Honestly, I know that God is the one who has put that question into my brain and heart. As I have come to know the people of All Saints, I've become very aware of this community's deep desire to minister to all the people of Warner Robins. We do that already



through ministries in so many areas; the Food Pantry, Family Promise, Breaking Barriers, Greeters, Ushers, Choir, Friends, the dreams of ministry possibilities associated with Holly House, and other blessed efforts. I also know that many of you also do much more in the wider community, beyond any "official" All Saints ministries...

But do we really know about the challenges some face in Warner Robins? The challenges of developing the skills to get meaningful jobs to ensure family security. The challenges of getting the kind of education to prepare for success. The challenges of finding the right kinds of community support to "connect the dots" when there's the need for help.

Not knowing where to turn can feel overwhelming. And being overwhelmed can lead to *stuckness*: an inability to find the way back to safety and wholeness.

I've been thinking and praying about how I can learn more about the people of Warner Robins. Honestly, I thought it was meant to be a solo mission (which truly is an overwhelming thought). Then it occurred to me, that while I do still desire to speak to the community beyond All Saints, the best place to start is with the folks right here at 1708 Watson Blvd. After all, y'all live and move around Warner Robins. What better place to start?

So, I have a request. Would you be willing to sit with me and tell me your stories of Warner Robins? I think this could be a beautiful beginning – one that allows us to see more clearly those things we have done and those things we've left undone, as well as potentially catch the movement of the Spirit, as she guides us in our work to make Warner Robins a more caring and equitable place for all our neighbors.

I have already asked some of you to meet me for a cup of coffee, just to have a chance for you to tell your Warner Robins story when I can truly listen and learn. And you don't have to wait for me to extend an invitation! I will be honored and thrilled to listen to your stories.



Year Round Stewardship: Acolytes - Walking the Path

When Keira Heidler was asked to be an acolyte last year, she wasn't so sure. Would she be ok sitting up front, away from her parents, all through the church service? And would this mean she would have to become a priest and give up her career dreams of coding and video game design?

Amy Floyd, the head of the acolyte ministry, assured her that no, this was not a life commitment, and no, coder and crucifer were not mutually exclusive vocations. Even so, for Keira as for many All Saints children, becoming an acolyte meant letting go of the familiar (putting into practice one of the themes we've studied during this past Lent).

For many children in the Episcopal Church, acolyte is the first official role they play in the service. Being an acolyte means having a job to do in the worship, not just sitting in the pew with their parents. It means marching through the nave in the robed procession, lighting candles, carrying a cross or banner. It means being conspicuous. Clara Buttersworth, another new acolyte who started in January this year, looks forward to rising in the ranks and being allowed to carry the cross at the front, because "that seems like a really important job," she says. She is enjoying her new role, even if she gets nervous about bumping into things while carrying her banner, or standing up or sitting down at the wrong time. Being an acolyte means taking risks, possibly making mistakes. It means learning and teaching (one of the pleasures of sitting in the choir is looking down into the transept as communion starts, watching the veteran acolytes coach the beginners on when and how to ring the bell). Being an acolyte means being part of a community. Keira may have worried about sitting away from her parents on her first acolyte Sunday, but now sitting with her friends is her favorite part.

Amy's acolyte experience at All Saints started in third grade. "Back then," she recalls, "it was just something you did when you got to that age. Some of the kids didn't do it, didn't want to, but I remember wanting to do it." Years later, when her oldest son turned nine, she took over as leader of the acolyte ministry. For her, training the acolytes is an opportunity to help kids understand Episcopal traditions. They learn the meanings of the different banners and symbols they carry. They learn not only where and how to bow when they get to the front of the nave, but why we show special respect for the crucifix and the communion elements. They learn why the service is different in different seasons, why we process in silence during Lent and have a different-sounding bell when we follow the Rite I worship. Divided into four teams with three or four members each, the kids take turns serving on ordinary Sundays. For Easter and Christmas, though, they all take part, carrying candles or swinging incense to celebrate the feast.

The acolyte ministry is a reminder, to the children and to all, that in our church all are welcome, even the youngest—all are wanted, and all have a part to play.

The Greeters ministry has grown over the past few years to be a vital part of our faith path together. Greeters in teams of two meet parishioners and newcomers with a warm smile and name tag at the first stop on their way to the pew. The welcome table also has activity bags for youngsters, a flier on church activities, and sign-up sheets for various activities for all to participate.

The Greeters ministry is open to members of all ages and consists of arriving 15 minutes before services to assist at the welcome table (already in place, thanks to our ushers) as people arrive, as well as at the end of services, as people depart. The rotation of teams of two is usually once a month.







Last month we started a new Family Promise Fund Raiser that we are calling Caring Coins. As you can imagine, the large Family Promise facility in Perry has many expenses. We periodically make donations to help with the utilities. If you would like to help, please pick up a Caring Coins bag in the office or the Parish Hall. The containers are the perfect size to hold \$10 worth of quarters. There is no due date for coins. Whenever you fill the container, you may place it in the plate on Sunday or turn it in to the office. A big thank you to those who have already contributed! We were able to send a donation last month.

In March, we were fortunate to share a couple of meals with the residents of Family Promise. Thank you to all of you who donated to the dinner meals. The families are provided a dinner meal three nights per week. There are many churches who support this effort. These meals help the residents reduce their grocery expenses. Everything they save can be used for future housing down payments. All the parents are working and saving to have the needed funds to get back into independent living. They are doing some very long days parenting, working full time, and some are taking classes. It is so inspiring to hear the residents talk about their plans for the future. Please keep these young families in your prayers.
