Happy New Year! After a wonderfully full Advent season and beginning of Christmas-tide, I look forward to 2023 as a time of both new opportunities and the chance to lean into becoming more of who we are as God's people at All Saints.

As I look at the past two months, I am truly thankful for Advent and Christmas seasons filled with the blessings of sacred worship: contemplative Noonday prayer, beautiful Lessons and Carols, a spirited children's choir, a precious Children's Pageant, and (a favorite of mine) sacred singing by candlelight on Christmas Eve. So many opportunities to gather in praise and thanksgiving for God's gift of life and love. I find so much hope for what our world can be – a place of mercy, justice, and peace – as we are strengthened by the Word, nourished at the Table, and grow in community each week.

And speaking of community, I'm so very grateful for our life together: our times of fellowship, food, and learning, from our Monthly Covered Dish Meals and Town Hall meetings, to Monday Book group, Education for Ministry, Inquirer's classes, and seasonal programs. These offerings provide a wonderful way for small and large groups to more fully come to know one another and the many ways we can lean into our love of Christ and one another, as the people of All Saints.

I'm always excited to see the many ways this community leans into our call to serve others. As I write this, I expect the Food Pantry will serve well over 200 families, including over 600 family members during the months of November and December alone. Breaking Barriers sits side-by-side with our Food Pantry ministry each week, providing assistance with obtaining critical government identification and distributing much-needed financial help for utilities through your generous gifts to the Rector's Discretionary Fund. And our faithful ECW has once again generously given \$10,000 in donations this year, through the Spring Wine and Cheese and Fall Marketplace fundraisers. And good work continues in our support of local families through Family Promise and Westside Elementary.

As All Saints continues our efforts to work with the broader community, we have become involved with a new initiative to address homelessness in our area. A new Homelessness Coalition Initiative has begun, which includes Houston County city and county governments, local businesses, churches, and other non-profit providers, all committed to working together to address this important concern in our local community. Expect to hear more about how we can support this good work, as this winter there will be a community Warming Center.

Save the Date for our Annual Meeting on Sunday 1/22/2023, as we will be sharing more of what's been happening at All Saints in 2022 and our plans for 2023. I do expect that this year will be once again *be more* — more than we can ask for or imagine — as we strive to work together in community, putting our faith in our Risen Lord.

What a blessing to have the Spirit lead us to serve and welcome and share Christ's light and love in the world. And may you all have a blessed beginning of 2023, as we continue our faith journey together as the family of All Saints

Year Round Stewardship: About Time

"Come on." I paused in the turn lane, waiting for an opening in the traffic. I tensed and glanced at the clock. Errands to run, deadlines, appointments to get to, and again the worry of getting there late. Another day, in other words.

Then I started to notice what the radio was saying. The speaker kept using the words "time" and "clock" and "slow." A scientist was explaining: "A lot of us grow up being fed this idea of time as absolute. . . . Real time is actually something quite different. In some of the odder corners of the universe, time can stretch and slow–and sometimes even break down completely." She and other interviewees went on to talk about atomic clocks and gravity and black holes–about how distance and altitude can make time move faster or slower. At some point in the future, they said, as the universe expands, entropy may make it so that time has "no real meaning" and "no direction." As I pulled into the strip mall and slid into a parking spot, other scientists were concluding that "space-time is doomed."

I didn't understand all of it, but in my frazzled state, I found these explanations oddly reassuring. (Hey, if time possibly does not exist, maybe I don't have to worry so much about being late. I'll just blame it on physics). For my highly unscientific brain, the statements were also dizzying. Like most people I know, I grew up thinking that to function as a human means, in large part, paying attention to time, and that time meant, simply, whatever the clock said (hoping that clock matches the one in the next room). Being at school before 8:15. Punching the clock before my 1:30 shift. Logging my 45 minutes of piano practice. Having my scholarship application in by November 2. Getting to the pharmacy before it closed at 9 pm. Now, more and more often, I'm the one enforcing time constraints. Which of my students are on time and which are late? Who has their quiz completed before September 9? Are we still rehearsing at 4:15? Go talk to tech support–their office closes at 5.

If time is a social construct and not actually real–well, where do we start? And after all the warnings we've all heard about being good stewards of time–well, how do we steward a resource that may or may not actually exist?

I may be overdramatizing a little. The physicists on NPR did acknowledge that most of the stretchings and slowings of time that we are likely to experience on this planet in our lifetime are tiny, too tiny to make much difference for day-to-day scheduling purposes. Social constructs may not be "real" in the sense of being scientifically verifiable, but they can be useful as long as everyone agrees to treat them as realities.

Even so, it does make one pause.

At the start of new years, people tend to think a lot about time and what we do with it. We send letters to our friends and work supervisors listing all the things we've done in the past year and our goals for the year to come. We make resolutions to spend more time exercising or praying or talking with family and friends–less time on TV or internet surfing or whatever kind of procrastination we may have fallen into. The solar system pictures I have seen have never suggested that there is a "starting line" or "finish line" at this particular point in Earth's orbit around the sun, but for those of us who follow the Gregorian calendar, we have all collectively agreed to treat this point, the start of January, as a time to think, take stock, and make plans. We've been told that God is not bound by time. I do not understand this, any more than I understand why time might cease to exist if one gets too close to a black hole. But keeping this idea in mind might help me to keep a healthy tension in my perspective on time. Time is part of our experience in this world, and a tool that can help give our lives structure, but it is not the whole story. Maybe that's something to remember the next time I'm running late and stuck for too long in the left turn lane.

Epiphany Tradition: Chalking the Door



January 6 is the Feast of the Epiphany, sometimes called "Three Kings Day," and starts the Season after Epiphany which continues until Ash Wednesday. Epiphany is an invitation to follow stars, listen to dreams, and step out of what we have always known, as we recognize Christ's light in the world

The Gospel of Matthew (Matthew 2:1-12) tells us of the day the magi arrived in Bethlehem, directed by angels and guided by a star, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to Jesus. Gold symbolized Jesus as a king. Frankincense and myrrh are sweet-smelling resins that were burned as sacred offerings and during burials. The magi then go home by another road. Little else is known about them, although a robust tradition has grown around them over time, including that the three were named Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar.

A couple of years ago we introduced another Epiphany tradition known as "Chalking the Door." This practice consists of marking a blessing in chalk in a specific pattern of letters and numbers, to invite God's blessing on a home, church, or other entryways, as well as all who enter those doorways during the year. All you need is chalk and a doorway. The markings are usually made above the front door or main entrance, in this pattern:

The numbers change each year to reflect the new calendar year. The letters C, M, and B are given two meanings: the initials of the traditional names of the three magi, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar, and the initials of the Latin phrase *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, which means, "Christ bless this dwelling." The + signs are for the Cross of Christ.

This year, All Saints will be offering chalk packets with instructions so you too may "chalk the doors" of your homes. Chalk packets will be available following our Sunday worship on January 1st.

Seeing these symbols can help remind us that our homes and all those who either dwell there or visit are God's beloved, to be welcomed into our homes and hearts. With time the chalk will fade. As it does, we let the meaning of the written symbols sink into our hearts and manifest in our words and actions.

Here's a prayer you may choose to use, as you use the chalk to bless your home:

O God Among Us, may we be visited by angels, may we follow stars, may we bring the gifts we have to offer. May we embrace the journey and travel in love. May Christ bless our homes and find a home in our hearts throughout the year. Amen.




