Year Round Stewardship: Patriotism as a Process

When I was seventeen, I spent a summer studying in France, at a school near the Swiss border. About two-thirds of the students were from the United States; the class also included a few Austrians and one student each from Brazil, the Netherlands, Norway, Denmark, Germany, Romania, and Canada. We were supposedly there to study French language and culture. We listened to lectures on Proust and Chateaubriand, and studied for grammar and orthography quizzes. We ate crêpes and raclette, explored the old city in Lyon, and admired the view from Mont-Blanc.

On the Fourth of July, however, the school arranged a distinctly un-French outing, busing the students five miles across the border to Geneva (a city with a high American expat population) for a pop concert, a game of football américain, and an evening of fireworks, or feux d'artifice. The U.S. students were jubilant at an evening of familiar celebration; the other students seemed divided between enjoyment of the entertainment and annoyance at being required to participate in their classmates' national traditions while their own were ignored. On the bus, the lone Canadian student (whose national holiday had passed unmentioned three days before) defiantly interrupted the chorus of "Star-Spangled Banner" by belting out a solo rendition of "O Canada."

At the time, I didn't think much about the event, except that it was pleasant to have a double dose of fireworks that summer; ten days later, of course, we marked Bastille Day with an equally impressive display in Annecy. Now, however, years later, I often remember that scene when July comes around, the month that for several nations seems synonymous with parades, pyrotechnics, and patriotism. We thought we were very patriotic, teenagers on a bus trying to outshout and outsing each other. For us, patriotism meant claiming our country was the best, the louder the better.

In more recent years, I have done some thinking about what else the word might mean. The word "Patriot" contains the Latin word pater, or "father." The word itself likens loyalty to one's country or "fatherland" to loyalty to one's family. Loving one's country doesn't mean thinking one's country is perfect, or even that it's better than all other countries. It doesn't mean pretending everything is all right when it harms you or others. It does mean that you and this country belong to each other; it does mean caring for others in the country, promoting their wellbeing (as far as one can without being unfair to people from other countries). It means being as much steward as a cheerleader, helping the country to be the best it can be, both by appreciating the good it offers and holding it accountable when it fails.

My understanding of patriotism has changed since I was a teenager in a bus singing my way into Switzerland. Probably yours has too in the past few decades. Perhaps what I've learned most is that patriotism—like friendship, like faith, like most parts of life—is a process, something we continue to try and practice and mess up and try again for as long as we're alive.

Happy Fourth of July!

As we take the time this July 4th to celebrate our Nation's independence, may we also take the time to pray for our beloved nation.



Lord God Almighty, you have made all the peoples of the earth for your glory, to serve you in freedom and in peace: Give to the people of our country a zeal for justice and the strength of forbearance, that we may use our liberty in accordance with your gracious will; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (BCP 258)


Digital Ministry

Education for Ministry (EfM)invites participants into a small, mentored group that provides the framework for understanding life and shaping actions as Christian faith is deepened. We do this through developing what we think

as Core Practices.

More than a Bible Study

At its heart EfM is a program in learning to practice living in Christ. While we do study the Old Testament, New Testament, Christian History, and Christian Theology, we also examine our beliefs and their relationship to our culture and the traditions of our Christian faith. Together we learn to discern how we can carry Christ's love into the world in the various ministries to which we are called. Core Practices include:

- Living in Community
- Regular Prayer and Worship
- Theological Reflection
- Study of the Christian Tradition
- Vocational Discernment


