I was recently with a very close group of friends. We were all reading the same book, *The Church Cracked Open*, by The Rev. Stephanie Spellers, an Episcopal priest. It is a difficult book, not because it is hard to read but because it's one of those books that definitely challenges the heart. We discovered together that we all knew many of the facts detailed in the book, but had not yet internally addressed the *spiritual challenge* of all



this information — that beginning of transformational change that takes place in the heart when something deeply touches the core of who we are. But together we found that our honest discussion and willingness to vulnerably share our deepest thoughts did spark one of the most important, although difficult conversations, we had ever faced together. My socks were knocked off as the Spirit seemed to blast the stuff in my head and shift it all deep within my heart. Suddenly, what we were discussing became **truly real** for me!

Conversations about race are difficult, yet this book provided us the opportunity to deeply examine our understanding of how the Christian Church has also been complicit — whether intentionally or not — in turning a polite, blind eye to important issues of justice and equity. Even our beloved Episcopal denomination has been involved in the systems that have held back our brothers and sisters, and we too must face the reality that our actions, or lack of actions, have always been outside the teachings of Jesus. Jesus is all about loving, compassionate service, until God's dream is finally realized and we can all live in a world of peace and are treated with dignity and respect. And we're called to partner with Jesus on that transformational change.

Today, we have the opportunity to do our part to make a holy shift today, toward living into God's dream, striving for justice and working towards a world where all God's children can thrive, living fully into who God has created them to be. As we continue in our journey to discern the possibilities for Holly House, how can we use this tremendous gift to reach out in the local community, building relationships with our brothers and sisters, and carry Christ's light into the world. Year Round Stewardship: Crusoe's Ship

It's been over a month since a tornado dropped two trees on my roof and flattened my garden shed into a pancake (by the time you read this, it will have been almost two months). There are days when I think I need a T-shirt that says, "THE NEXT PERSON WHO ASKS IF MY ROOF IS FIXED YET WILL GET A HYMNBOOK THROWN AT THEIR HEAD." But I'm getting things cleaned up, bit by bit. (Now that the semester is over, I can't use grading as an excuse to avoid it any more.) I stack up the bricks from the knocked-down garden wall and throw out the crumbled scraps of mortar. I fill in the hole left by a fallen tree and debate on whether to plant a new tree there or just scatter some grass seed. I scramble through a window of the wrecked shed (the door is too flat to open) to drag out the garden tools—a rake, a hoe, clippers, a trowel, a half-sack of potting soil and a few tomato cages. Clambering in and out the window, I feel oddly like a diver salvaging supplies from a sunken ship. What used to be ordinary tools now look like pieces of history, rescued companions, fellow-survivors who, along with me, must try to move forward and rebuild from the collapse.

While stacking and shelving the tools, I thought of G. K. Chesterton and his commentary on Robinson Crusoe:

"Crusoe is a man on a small rock with a few comforts just snatched from the sea: the best thing in the book is simply the list of things saved from the wreck. The greatest of poems is an inventory. Every kitchen tool becomes ideal because Crusoe might have dropped it in the sea. It is a good exercise, in empty or ugly hours of the day, to look at anything, the coal-scuttle or the book-case, and think how happy one could be to have brought it out of the sinking ship on to the solitary island. But it is a better exercise still to remember how all things have had this hair-breadth escape: everything has been saved from a wreck. . . . I really felt (the fancy may seem foolish) as if all the order and number of things were the romantic remnant of Crusoe's ship. That there are two sexes and one sun, was like the fact that there were two guns and one axe. It was poignantly urgent that none should be lost; but somehow, it was rather fun that none could be added. The trees and the planets seemed like things saved from the wreck: and when I saw the Matterhorn I was glad that it had not been overlooked in the confusion. I felt economical about the stars....[T]here had come into my mind a vague and vast impression that in some way all good was a remnant to be stored and held sacred out of some primordial ruin. Man had saved his good as Crusoe saved his goods: he had saved them from a wreck" (Orthodoxy, Chapter 4).

A wreck leaves people thinking differently about stewardship—it ratchets up the urgency. What I lose, I must find a way to repair or replace, or simply do without. And the things I haven't lost suddenly take on new meaning because I could have lost them but didn't. When I know something could have been lost, it suddenly seems important to use and enjoy whatever it is. Or, even when a thing isn't in use, I'm reminded to look at it with wonder and appreciation. And a wreck is a reminder that, as Chesterton says, each thing that exists around us—garden tools, stars and mountains, people and relationships—is a "Great Might-Not-Have-Been," a thing that could be lost but isn't.


Macon Bacon

- Based on your feedback, we're making tried it easier to both access and drop off your name tags.
 - We've spread out our name tags across two boards to avoid congestion and added a key on the top left of each board to help you find your last name. Do check both sides of the boards!
 - There's now a basket as well for those who prefer to drop off your name tags this way, rather than replacing on the boards.
- For those who would rather not use the magnetic name tags, we do have some holders with pins. Please feel free to drop by the Welcome Station to make an exchange.
