I recently read a news article that included pictures from the Webb telescope of 19 "nearby" spiral galaxies. The pictures were magnificent: infrared images allowing us to see our galactic neighbors in stunning clarity.



These images were mesmerizing, as I noted the accompanying descriptions of central stars, old and new; the sometimes occurrences of massive black holes; and the glowing dust of stars not yet formed. I found my mind wandering, and then drifting towards wonder.

Wonder, as pondered the seemingly infinite variety of constellations light-years away, for here was an infinitesimal glimpse of the enormity of all of Creation, formed into being by our Living, Loving God. Wonder, at Almighty God, who lovingly creates these massive stars that can live for billions or trillions of years, yet also creates us — small, fragile, flawed humankind — who exist for only an instant. How blessed we are to be loved into being and becoming, for we are all invited, welcomed, and called to all be a part of the Family of God.

Year Round Stewardship The Green Team: Stewarding the Planet

During Eucharistic Prayer C, we praise God as the creator of "this fragile Earth, our island home." During the past two years, caring for this "island home" has become a central mission of the All Saints Green Team, helping our congregation to find large and small ways to protect the air, water, and earth around us, and to partner with others who are doing the same.

The Green Team's efforts began in 2021, requesting an energy assessment by Georgia Interfaith Power and Lighting (GIPL) to gain guidance in conserving energy on our church campus. With help from three GIPL grants, the team has had new LED lighting installed in the Parish Hall, Sanctuary, and Christian Education Building. The team hopes to use a fourth grant during the coming year to begin replacing insulation where needed.


Sandy Scammell and Susan Wynn recently attended a GIPL summit at Oak Grove United Methodist Church in Decatur, where the keynote speaker, Calvin University professor Debra Reinstra, linked faith with the concept of *refugia*. *Refugia*, she explained, are the small, sheltered pockets of wildlife that survive when an ecosystem is devastated by a volcano, wildfire, or other disaster—a few plants beneath a fallen tree, or a patch of moss and a rodent's nest under a rock. In the months and years after the disaster, the life in these tiny patches grows. Seeds and spores spread and germinate into plants that offer new food and shelter for the surviving animals and their young. Gradually, new life reclaims the devastated area. Faith communities, Reinstra insisted, are called to serve as *refugia*—amid the pollution and climate change created by human carelessness and greed over the past decades, we can be pockets of resilience.

Like the tiny *refugia* in a burning forest, Sandy says, our efforts at creation care can look small and unimpressive—things as simple as using reusable plates and cups at our potlucks and coffee bars, recycling our paper bulletins, or donating plastic shopping bags to Halo to be woven into sleeping mats for our homeless neighbors. Susan grins mischievously and adds, "We swiped all the glass bottles after Wine and Cheese, and recycled those." These small changes, as they become habit, can spread beyond our church. As our church moves forward toward our purchase of Holly House, Sandy and Susan hope the expanded property can offer space for a community garden—our abundant leftover food and coffee grounds would offer plenty of material for compost. At the GIPL summit, they were also introduced to other ways of reaching our environmental efforts farther into the community, especially through legislative advocacy. Through letters and lobby meetings, GIPL members call on elected officials to stop mining around wildlife refuge areas and require industries to take responsibility for the toxic chemicals they release into the air and water.

For those who want to know more about the Green Team's work or to increase your own efforts to care for our "island home," you are invited to a GIPL event at our church on Saturday, March 2, 10 am to noon. "Active Hope: A Lenten Workshop on Sacred Activism," invites our congregation both to recognize the harms that are being done to our planet and to find creative ways to build and spread resilience.

Prayers for Healing, during Holy Eucharist Beginning March 17th



As you are outwardly anointed with this holy oil, so may our Heavenly Father grant you the inward anointing of the Holy Spirit. Of his great mercy, may he forgive you your sins, release you from suffering, and restore you to wholeness and strength. May he deliver you from all evil, preserve you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP, pg 456)

The Easter Triduum: A Sacred Tradition

Each year, All Saints marks the Triduum with one continuous, sacred liturgy commemorating the profound events of Jesus Christ's passion, death, and resurrection. Rooted in ancient Christian tradition, the Triduum offers a deeply meaningful and transformative journey for all God's people.

The Triduum begins on Maundy Thursday, as we gather to remember the Last Supper when Jesus instituted the sacrament of Holy Eucharist and then washed the feet of his disciples, showing us his path of humility and servant leadership.

Good Friday follows, a day of solemn remembrance, as we recall Jesus' great sacrifice on the cross, for the sake of all humanity.

The final event of the Triduum is the sunrise Easter Vigil, the first liturgy of Easter morning, as we celebrate the joy of the empty tomb and Jesus' resurrection.

Do consider experiencing the entire Triduum this year, a way to delve more deeply into the heart of our faith by walking with Jesus through his final days on this earth and encountering, with the dawn of Easter morning, the transformative power of the resurrection.




