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Mother Bonnie's Corner

What does November bring to All Saints? All Saints Evensong, The Feast of All Saints, Veteran's Day, Election Day prayer time, a beautiful piano recital, Thanksgiving Eve worship, and the beginning of Advent. So many opportunities to come together in community for prayer, worship, and fellowship.

We are so blessed to begin this month by acknowledging that we are all part of something so much bigger than ourselves: the Communion of Saints. For in Christ, we are intrinsically linked to all those who have gone before us, those who walk with us, and those who are yet to come.

This knowledge of our connectedness, with God's help, can help us to break those human barriers and roadblocks that divide and separate us one from another: gender, race, religion, sexual identity, economics, power, and partisanship. God longs for us to live in unity with all our brothers and sisters, turning away from caring only for ourselves and our own. We are lovingly invited to open our hearts to the Spirit of Truth, becoming more of who we have been created to be.

 We are all called by Jesus. Called to love one another as he loves us; to compassionately care for each other as we are cared for; to recognize that all are beloved by God as God's own and are worthy of dignity and respect, regardless of what the world tells us.

So how do step away from the noise of the world and instead lean into thanksgiving and gratitude as Christ's own? Through transformative practices that help us align our lives with Christ. Praying daily for the Spirit's guidance; walking together in ministries that help us support one other and our neighbors; worshipping in community, where we are strengthened by the Word, nourished by Christ's Body and Blood, and are then sent out as a community, to carry Christ's light into the world.

The call to follow Christ is a lifelong process of conversion requiring us to let go of our former identities built strictly on "us" — our gifts, our achievements, our social standing — in order to embrace a new identity in Christ. Jesus invites us to become changed people whose lives are characterized by love, joy, peace, patience, and kindness . . . a people of humble gratitude.

So as we mark each of the many things to do this month, may we also lean into our place as the saints of All Saints, living into our call to love God and our neighbor and together striving daily for justice and peace among all people, respecting the dignity of every human being.

Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

From our Deacon

A week or so ago, I was talking to a friend, recalling the 1994 flood that hit Macon. We discussed the challenges and difficulties of living for 5 weeks without water and striving to help our neighbors and make sure that folks who couldn't get around so easily got plenty of bottled water, and other necessities.

We found ourselves laughing at the creative ways we used the every-other-day rain. It seemed that everyone had suddenly cultivated the habit of keeping some shampoo and a towel in the car, so when it rained, it seemed the whole town of Macon stopped what we were doing,



jumped out of the car, washed our hair, got back in the car, wrapped a towel around our heads, and then went on our way. Creative and effective!

That reminded me of an ice storm one winter that took out power for a week, presenting another opportunity to face challenges together. My husband Mike had a 4-wheel drive pickup back then and we'd let the folks in our neighborhood know we were going to the grocery store, so we could add their very reasonable lists to our own, and then deliver their groceries to them.

And just this week I was sharing a story from the Mother's Day Tornado of 2008, when the most vulnerable neighborhoods in Macon were hit the hardest, landing us once again in a world of both challenges and creative opportunities. And there was real joy in recalling some great stories about how we pulled together in some spectacularly, creative ways to help our brothers and sisters.

And I imagine I don't have to say anything about how we were all challenged by the COVID pandemic, and again, how we were able to be creative and adapt as a community!

Why, you are probably wondering, am I writing this now?

Because it reminds me how blessed we are when we pull together as a community to meet community challenges. How blessed we are when we dust off our creative skills and, with open hearts, join with strangers who have the same heart-filled desire to help. This joining together in community is when we, as humankind, are absolutely at our best.

And that reminds me that we don't have to have some sort of natural disaster — or ANY disaster for that matter — to join together to creatively meet community challenges. In my book, this is an act of love. And God smiles at us when we simply remember that we can and should come together to creatively address today's big challenges, for that's when we truly are, with God's help, doing love the best.

There is a lot going on in the world today that presents all kinds of challenges to all sorts of folk: hunger, joblessness, homelessness, illness, stranger-ness. You can probably add more to this list.

My prayer is that we will all do just a little bit more, a little more often, taking that same courage and creativity to pull together as God's children and lovingly care for one another with the same passion and call that inflames our hearts, when the going is really tough!

That's who we are called to be, in good times and bad: bearers of Christ's love. All we gotta do is love!

Year Round Stewardship: No Fewer Days

One day after church when I was six years old, my mother asked me, "Why were you not singing when we were singing in church?"

I said, "I didn't know the songs."

She decided to put a stop to that excuse. The following Friday morning, she called the church secretary's office and asked, "What hymns are in the bulletin for this week's service?" (This was before bulletins were emailed out to the whole congregation in the middle of the week.)

That evening at family worship, my mother opened her hymnal and read out the first line of the lyrics:

"Standing on the promises of Christ my King.' Now you try it."

I repeated: "'Standing on the promises of Christ my King."

"Through eternal ages let his praises ring."

I repeated.

"Glory in the highest, I will shout and' . . . What do you think that last word is?"

"Ring?"

"No, we already said 'ring.' Let's try 'sing.'"

"Ok."

When we had gone over all the first-verse lyrics, we tried singing them. And so on to the second and third verses. My mother paused to explain that "assail" meant to attack or try to hurt someone, and "prevail" meant to win.

In church, as soon as I heard the piano play the first line of the hymn, I jumped up and joined in, singing the words louder than anyone.

This became part of our weekly routine—my mother would find out the hymns for the week, the whole family would practice at evening worship, and then we would sing the songs again in church. Sometimes motions or acting-out were involved; when teaching "Spirit of the Living God," my mother used a bar of chocolate to demonstrate "Break me, melt me, mold me, fill me." We learned many new vocabulary words in the process ("in vain," "forbid," "garner"), though not always correctly (somehow I got the idea that "sublime" was a citrus fruit—maybe like a lime, but not growing quite so high on the tree). Some of the hymns gained nicknames.

My brother Paul renamed "Crown him with Many Crowns" as "Lord of Many Heads"; "How Brightly Shines the Morning Star" was dubbed "The Veggie Burger Hymn"; and somehow, "Fairest Lord Jesus" became familiarly known as "Beautiful Mr. Jesus." Occasionally, we corrected the hymn's grammar (my mother always insisted that on the last verse of "Amazing Grace," we had "no fewer days to sing God's praise"—not "less days," because "day" is a countable noun). As I became able to read more, I started to pick out words and punctuation marks on the page (I was always proud when I picked out a question mark in the song title).

When I turned eight, my parents gave me my own copy of the hymnal—a pocket-size copy with tiny print and see-through pages. I began making a list of "favorite hymns" in my big second-grader handwriting, starting with the Christmas songs and building from there to stretch over several pages of the legal pad my dad had given me to scribble on. When I was sick one weekend and had to stay home from church, I lined my dolls and stuffed animals up and made them sing hymn after hymn, interspersed with call-and-response scripture readings.

These Friday evening hymn practices with my English teacher parents probably helped to seal my fate as an English teacher (and a church chorister). My mind goes to these practices when I pause a freshman writing class to explain a difficult word or reference, or when I have a group of student actors go over and over a scene from A Midsummer Night's Dream. My parents taught me to use words and sounds and songs—to take care of them, to pay attention to them, to have fun with them, to "sing with the Spirit and with the understanding also," as the apostle Paul told the Corinthians. This is what we are doing when we teach children (or people of any age) the stories we love or the skills we know they'll need, whether it is singing, sewing, or video editing. We teach them to be stewards of that skill—we show them a new space to explore and (we hope) discover joy, and we give them a new tool with which to serve God and others.

Consecration Sunday Update

A good time was had by all at the Consecration Sunday luncheon!

Tammy Pallot, our guest speaker, spoke of her spiritual journey, stewardship, and faith in God. Forty pledge cards were returned, with half of those returned taking a step up, plus four new families.

Over the next few weeks, we will be receiving cards from those who were not able to attend the celebration. Once all cards are in, our estimated projection of giving next year reflects roughly a 6% increase over 2022.

And there's still time to purchase tickets for *Jazz in the City* on November 6th, another fundraiser for this important ministry, helping families to transition from homelessness to stability.




